At Dukeries Academy you will be responsible for all of your books and equipment a lot of the time. That means each day you will need to make sure you have everything you need for the day ahead.





#### THE TELLING GAME

It can be hard for students to know when to tell somebody that they have a problem or they think something is wrong.

Here are some scenarios that are based on questions raised by previous Year 6 students. Some do happen at Dukeries (like losing your pen!), but others are very unlikely to happen. They have been included as they are based on previous questions that students have asked.

Please use the cards provided in the pack and talk about what you think you could do in each situation.

The work book has the questions and you have some possible answers. These answers are not set in stone. Please feel free to think of other ways to solve the problems and I will be happy to discuss these with you at a later date.



#### You have lost your pen.

What should you do?

You could ask as friend

or your teacher

Every day when you're in school, a student comes up to you and calls you rude names.

Who should you tell?

Your tutor or progress leader and write a statement

You have forgotten or lost your timetable.

What should you do?

Ask student services to print a new one. Take a photograph on your phone **but** make sure you don't look at it on the corridor.

#### A student has taken your lunch

What should you do?

Ask for it back.

Tell a member of staff/mid day.

Two of your friends have fallen out and aren't speaking to each other.

What could you do?

Stay friends with them both as they haven't fallen out with you.

A student spills their drink on you at break or lunch – they say it's an accident, but you think it was on purpose.

What should you do?

Tell a mid day supervisor or member of staff on duty.

Somebody catches you with their elbow or you trip over somebody's foot.

What could you do?

Don't get into an argument over it. Accidents happen on busy corridors and in classrooms.

Your friend has started calling you a nickname. They think its's funny but you don't

What could you do?

Talk to them and explain how you feel. Tell your tutor.

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A student borrows your pencil and they return it broken. What could you do? Sharpen both pieces-you have 2 pen- cils now. Ask to borrow one from your teacher if you can't sharpen it.	You have left your equipment/PE kit/coat somewhere in the academy. What should you do? Retrace your steps at break/lunch. Ask at reception. Ask at student services-ask them to email staff to look out for it.
You are in a lesson and your friend isn't helping you to tidy up.	You notice a student sitting by themselves looking upset
